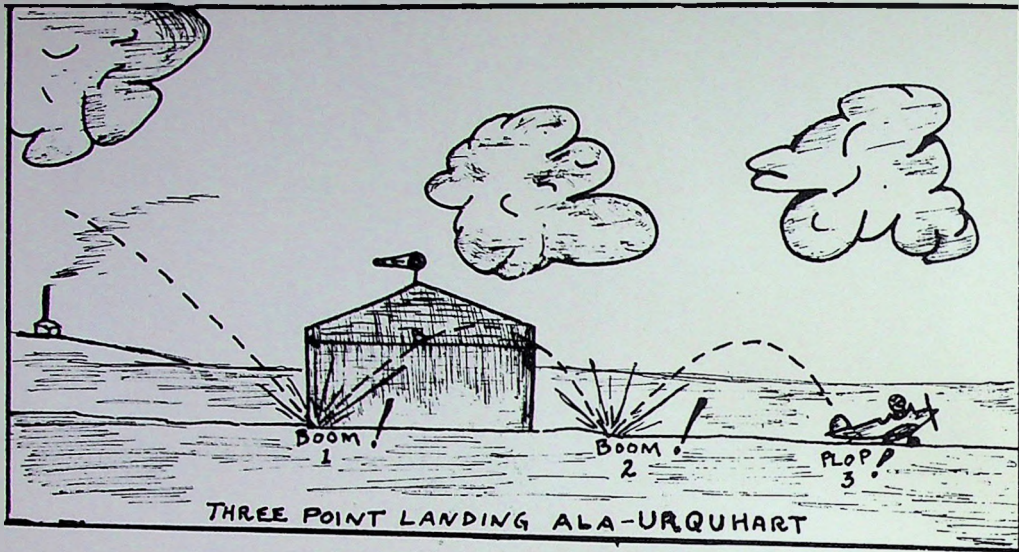
The purpose of any class book is to provide a medium which in future years can be dusted off to recall a particular period of one's life that has been preserved by words and pictures.
